

Jewish Life in North Carolina

The mission of the Greensboro Historical Museum states that we will "tell the city's compelling history in countless ways," and declares that we have a commitment to "community service, dialogue and relevancy that never wavers." In April the museum will debut *Down Home: Jewish Life in North Carolina*, an exhibition that shares the rich history of the Jewish people in our state. When the Jewish Heritage Foundation of North Carolina approached us as being one of five institutions to host the exhibition state wide, we knew that this project had special relevancy to Greensboro.



ArchivesJewish Collections

lthough Archives does not hold extensive Jewish history material, we have some wonderful items. The Cone family is the best represented, with a large group of photograph albums and two small paperbased collections on Clarence and Ceasar Cone II. Another larger collection documents the business and professional career of Benjamin Cone. In fact, one of the most delightful items in all of Archives is a 1951 letter to Cone "written" by the babies at the Children's Home Society, guaranteed to bring a big smile to your face. Photographs taken by Bernard Cone between the 1890s and 1910s, are all expertly photographed and composed. They are fascinating, documenting the Cone textile business, the extended Cone family, and even more valuable to us, the textile workers, mill village life, and the broader world of Greensboro.

Archives also houses smaller collections including images of the Sternberger family, Temple Emanuel, Beth David Synagogue and Schiffman's Jewelry. Just




recently located during a microfilm search—an 1852 ad for Einstein & Co., what is believed to be the first Jewish business in Greensboro.

The Pleasure of Your Company



A stunning gown of maize and cream satin, worn by teenager Mina Rosenthal at her marriage to Henry Weill, illustrates the deep and lasting connections of Jewish traditions and families across North Carolina communities.

Mina was born in 1859 in Wilson, where her father Emil was a merchant. One of Emil's frequent visitors was Henry Weil, a partner in H. Weil & Bros. clothing and dry goods business in nearby Goldsboro, who fell in love with Mina and asked for her hand in marriage. The couple married on March 24, 1875 at Baltimore's Hanover Street Temple.

Mina and Henry made their lives in Goldsboro, where they raised three daughters and one son. At Mina's death in 1940, memorials praised her "bright spirit," philanthropic nature and devotion to her community. Daughter Janet established a scholarship fund

in her mother's name at Woman's College, and in 1943 the college named Weil-Winfield dormitory in Mina Weil's honor. Mina's grandson, Arthur Bluethenthal of Greensboro, donated her remarkable gown, soon to be on exhibit, to the museum in 1982.

Governor Jim Hunt, Honorary Chair of Down Home and a driving force in its success, advocated the importance of this project not only for the Jewish community, but for all North Carolinians. Over 75,000 people from diverse backgrounds visited the interactive exhibit during its showing in Raleigh, giving it enthusiastic endorsement.

The Greensboro Historical Museum has the distinct honor of being chosen as one of just five venues to host this traveling exhibit, which comes to Greensboro after its premiere showing at the North Carolina Museum of

History. Opening festivities are highlighted by a reception on April 10 and remarks by distinguished author and historian Eli Evans.

Down Home's key themes of Keeping the Faith, Family Comes First, Building Businesses Creating Communities, and Love of Learning have special resonance for Greensboro, a city with foundations in many strong

faith traditions and a legacy of generations

of significant Jewish business and civic leadership. A supplemental presentation will add unique

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
